### You Are Not Alone

Come Out and Meet Your Neighbors

Jefferson Westside is a place where many of us walk or cycle and greet our neighbors every day. But how often do you get a chance to have a conversation with those neighbors? The JWN general meetings and our regular social hours are great ways to break out of your bubble and make vital human connections.

#### Loneliness and Social Isolation

You likely have heard or read about the effects of loneliness and social isolation. If you sometimes feel lonely you are not alone. About half of U.S. adults report feeling lonely or isolated, especially young adults. The outcomes extend beyond emotional or psychological.

According to the U.S. Surgeon General, loneliness and social isolation increase the risk for premature death (+26% and +20%,respectively). More broadly, lacking social connection can increase

the risk for premature death as much as smoking up to 15 cigarettes a day. Poor or insufficient social connections are associated with an increased risk of disease, including a 29% increased risk of heart disease and a 32% increased risk of stroke. Furthermore, loneliness is associated with an increased risk for anxiety, depression, and dementia. The lack of social connection may also increase susceptibility to viruses and respiratory illness. The JWN's Disaster Preparedness Committee will demonstrate go bags, get home bags, back-up power, food and water storage strategies, and emergency preparedness for multifamily residences.


guided meditations with sound bath accompaniment (10% off first group session of 4 or more participants for JWN neighbors).

### Seeking JWN Board Elections Nominating Committee Members



during the April 8, 2025 general meeting. The board consists of seven members and terms are for one year. Any member of the neighborhood association (anyone who lives or owns property, or owns or manages a business or non-profit within the JWN boundaries) and has attended and signed in at one of the previous six JWN general meetings may run for the board.

Following the procedures outlined in the JWN bylaws, the board will designate a nominating committee at least one month in advance of the election. The nominating committee will consist of one executive board member and two members of the association who are not board members. The committee will publish a slate of nominees for office and voter pamphlet on the JWN website at least 14 days prior to the election.



### Great Idea, Make it Happen!

In 2008, the City of Eugene Neighborhoods program conducted a city-wide survey about neighborhood associations. As a JWN representative, I sat on the committee that helped develop that survey. Largely through the work of neighborhood associations, the survey

received more than 4,000 responses. Among many other questions, we asked people what would make them want to participate in their neighborhood association. Two of the top responses were: "knowing someone else who participates" and "making a difference." A year later, I was hired as a staff person in the neighborhoods program where I worked with all 23 of the city's neighborhood associations until I retired in 2021.

### **Knowing Someone Who Participates**

I'll get back to what that survey meant, but first a little history. My first neighborhood meeting was more than 20 years ago. It was a lively meeting attended by about 40 neighbors. Back then we met at the McNail Riley House. Fast forward a year and I was the co-chair of Jefferson Westside Neighbors. We quickly exceeded the capacity of McNail Riley House and moved to the First United Methodist Church where we still meet.

Over the next few years I met and worked with people who were my nearby (Jefferson) neighbors and many who lived in the Westside part of the neighborhood. I likely wouldn't have met *any* of these neighbors—several of them are still good friends—if it hadn't been for



my involvement with JWN. In the five years I was on the board, we held big annual picnics, elected a board every year, hosted a tree party and great meetings, and addressed many of the issues that are still ongoing—streets, parks, re/development, homelessness, services, and, most importantly, building and maintaining community connections.

#### Making a Difference

We generated even more participation as we worked to develop the JWN Special Area Zone (SAZ). To involve our neighbors in developing the proposed SAZ, we applied for a neighborhood matching grant to support workshops, wrote newsletter articles, hosted an online forum, and featured the SAZ at many neighborhood meetings. For the final vote on the SAZ, more than 100 neighbors attended and voted 99-3 in favor. Both the Planning Commission and the Eugene City Council unanimously approved the JWN Special Area Zone.

### Knowing Someone + Making a Difference

When I rejoined the JWN board in 2021, it was both familiar and new. The history I brought with me as a returning board member wasn't about me, it was about "we" and what we ALL accomplished—together. Since then, challenges of reduced funding and support for neighborhood associations, new statewide laws on zoning and infill, and changes in local political leadership have had a direct impact on how well neighborhood associations can support neighbors. The work of the JWN board is crucial to addressing these challenges.

JWN's future depends on you—whether you choose to serve on the board (and I highly recommend it!) or a committee, volunteer in our parks, work on neighborhood preparedness, attend a meeting or social hour, or initiate your own project with JWN board support.

#### Making it Happen in Your Neighborhood

I'll close with a quote from one of my favorite IWN board members who, when a small group came to board meeting with an idea that they intended for the board to take it on, replied "Great idea, make it happen."



So, if you have a great idea, make it happen, neighbors!

### You Plan to Fail if you Fail to Plan

JWN Disaster Preparedness Committee Helps Neighbors Prepare

While major disasters like the Cascadia earthquake loom in our future, emergencies like ice storms, water system failures, floods, or wildfires happen with increasing regularity. Climate change has fundamentally altered the nature of the game with regular weather-related events becoming more severe, hotter hots, colder colds, and more intense rain or lack of it.

#### Adapt and Prepare

Eugene's infrastructure, much of which dates back to the 1800s, was designed for a climate that no longer exists. Updating the city's infrastructure will take decades and massive amounts of capital. In the meantime, communities and individuals must adapt and prepare. The JWN Disaster Preparedness Committee helps neighbors take action to blunt the effects of emergencies through education and creating neighborhood-level coordination.

Thinking about emergencies, let alone disasters, can be daunting. Faced with unknowns it is easy to simply checkout. Often disaster preparation suggestions seem so extreme and complicated that neighbors feel there is nothing they can do or they cannot afford being prepared when struggling with the day-to-day demands of life. It does not have to be that way. Whether you are a homeowner or a renter, there are basic steps you can take to be better prepared.

### Every Problem is a Series of Smaller Problems

EWEB's Pledge to Prepare program (eweb.org/p2p) offers a clear path to build resilience with tasks you

complete every month. If you are signed up for the JWN eVents and eNews, those tips are sent directly to you. For example,



experts recommend that you keep one gallon of water per person per day for a three-day supply (don't forget pets). Gallon containers of water are inexpensive and long lasting. Having extra food is as simple stocking up on your regular staples when they are on sale.

Many steps are low or no

cost. The first is to get to know your neighbors. In an emergency, working together with neighbors will be critical as outside help may not be immediately available. Making an action plan, preparing a go bag, and writing up a list of must save items are essentially free. As we have seen with the devastating Southern California wildfires, living in built-out urban neighborhoods is no protection when vegetation is dry and the wind starts blowing. Having a list of what to grab means you won't have to try and remember under pressure. Los Angeles residents had just minutes to evacuate. Using your phone to video personal belonging is easy and will greatly expedite dealing with insurance companies. Preparation takes minutes, regrets are long lasting.
